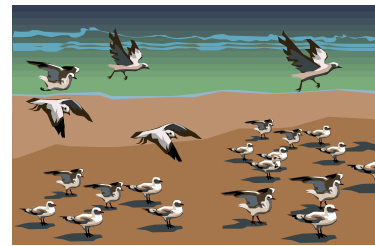
Kitchen Committee Co-chair Needed

MOVE TO AMEND

Millennium Salon - Sunday, FEBRUARY 26, 12:15

Greg Coleridge, Northeast Ohio Director of American Friends Service Committee, will share his views of the need to "end corporate personhood and money as speech" on Sunday, February 26, at 12:15 p.m. here at East Shore UU Church.

Greg will facilitate a presentation and discussion of *Citizens United vs. FEC*, the 2010 Supreme Court decision that expanded the right of corporations to spend money in elections, and *Move to Amend*, the widening nationwide grassroots effort to end the legal doctrines that corporations are people and money is speech. These topics are especially timely given the 2012 federal elections where Super PAC's (created following the Citizens United decision) are playing a more prominent role and people without money are growing more concerned about having their political voices heard and needs met.

In addition to being Northeast Ohio Director of the AFSC, Greg Coleridge is a member of the Program on Corporations, Law & Democracy (POCLAD) national collective and the original *Move to Amend* national steering committee. He is also the author of *A Brief History of Democracy in Ohio and Challenges to Freedom in the Future*, writer of the documentary *CorpOrNation* (The Story of Citizens and Corporations in Ohio), and contributor to the book, *Defying Corporations, Defining Democracy: A Book of History and Strategy*.
